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1 INTRODUCTION

1.1 OVERVIEW

Star Sports, Sparrow Sports and BubbSoc has developed a Risk Management Plan (RMP) to ensure we provide a safer environment for all members, participants, officials, spectators and volunteers. Bubble soccer is a new activity, and agreeing to participate in the service that BubbSoc provides, participants will have consented to risks, which are generally part of soccer. Whilst the law doesn't require an establishment like such to provide a risk free environment, the BubbSoc group values the safety of individuals involved. This has been done through implementing a risk management plan.

1.2 AIM AND OBJECTIVE

This risk management plan aims to:

- Be aware of the potential risks involving bubble soccer
- Control the occurrence of risks associated and implementing steps to minimise the impact
- Provide a fair, safe and well managed environment for all members, participants, officials, spectators and volunteers
- The code of conduct and bubble soccer game rules provide a safe gaming environment

The risks identified fall under two potential categories:

- Physical
- Ethical risks

This will be detailed in the following sections.

2 RISK MANAGEMENT PLAN

Threats may be encountered through the duration of a game. The BubbSoc Environment is vulnerable to physical and ethical risk therefore it is necessary for risk to be identified and assessed. The reliability and confidence toward a safe environment is further regarded only when measures are taken to counteract the possible risks.

The risk matrix utilised for the physical and ethical hazards assessment is shown in Table 9 This method has been adopted to identify the likelihood and the consequence for the possible risks in order to help better understand the severity of each risk – overall risk rating. Table 2, Table 3 and Table 4 shows the definitions of the consequences, likelihood and risk criteria, respectively. Controls for each hazard in this project have been considered as a result of this risk matrix.

APPENDIX A

Bubble Soccer Rules

- 1. Game will start with both teams on their own side. Referee will roll the ball to one team at random and the game will begin. This will also happen after each goal is scored.
- 2. Players may be anywhere on the field at any time (no offside penalties) however there will be warnings in the following instances:
 - a. When a player is down, you must give them space and time to get back up. You must not bump into or jump on a player that is down.
 - b. You cannot charge into a player from behind in a manner in which you are running at, or close to, full speed.
 - c. No purposeful contact should ever be made to the bubble with your feet.
- 3. Players must stay within the boundaries of the field. The goal is located outside the boundaries by a few feet so that they don't get run over and damaged. There is no permanent goalie. (What fun would that be anyway? Get out there and join the intense action!)
- 4. Referee will determine all boundaries and local rules for each game depending on location of the game and whether it is indoors or outdoors. Referee will also determine all warnings, penalties, and consequences.
- 5. LONG DISTANCE, FULL SPEED COLLISIONS THAT ARE PLANNED FOR THE SAKE OF FUN OR VIDEOS ARE STRICTLY PROHIBITED AND IS GROUNDS FOR TERMINATING THE REMAINDER OF THE EVENT!

Code of Conduct

- Proper clothing must be worn at all times while participating in the bubble
 activities. No cleats or sandals. No jewellery or any other accessory that may injure
 you or damage the bubble suit. Pants are permitted but we suggest shorts or other
 workout gear as you will get hot and sweaty while in the bubble suit.
- Players are not allowed to kick the bubbles at any time. We realize that, on occasion, when you are on the ground, your feet may come in contact with another bubble, but please refrain from kicking it or rubbing your shoes against it.
- Players will not be permitted to participate in any bubble activities under the influence of alcohol or drugs. Any player that does so unbeknownst to the Bouncing Bubbles staff does so at their own risks and takes full responsibility for any consequences that may arise as a result of such.

- Excessive swearing and/or inappropriate or rude comments will not be permitted. We understand some may slip, especially with the nature of the activity, but try to be respectful of the people around you.
- Any purposeful attempt to pop or damage the bubble suits will result in an immediate removal from the activity and participant will be banned from using them again. Participant will also be required to pay for the cost of fixing or replacing the bubble suit.
- Bouncing Bubbles LLC recommends that each participant has personal insurance and a physical before participating in any physical activity such as bubble soccer.
- Players that are not in a bubble are not allowed to push, shove, or bump into another player that is in a bubble due to safety reasons.
- Players must sign a Waiver before participating in any bubble activity.
